Do Not Be Afraid: Living Faithfully in a World of Risk

My friends, we live today in a world of risk. Every single day, when we wake up in the morning, there's the chance that something bad is going to happen. A traffic accident. An unexpected expense. An emergency trip to the hospital. Bad news from a family member. On account of sin, we live in a fallen world, a world that is, as Paul says, "subjected to futility" and bound "to corruption" (Romans 8:20-21). Indeed, as Paul says later, "the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now" (Romans 8:22). Ever since God cursed the ground because of Adam's sin and exiled us from Paradise (Genesis 3), we have lived, from our birth to our death, in a world of risk.

Therefore, for us Christians, the question is: how do we live faithfully in this world of risk? Unfortunately, there are those out there who benefit from stirring up fear, either by exaggerating risks or by ceaselessly spotlighting them. One glaring example of this—quite tragically—is the news media, especially cable news and national publications. They know that fear is a powerful motivator to keep people engaged and watching. And so, beyond just informing, they often move into exciting, stirring up our fears (or other base emotions) for the sake of ratings and advertising dollars. Politicians, too, often play to our fears in order to increase their power. Sadly, the message "Be afraid!" can be very lucrative.

But what does Jesus say? Our Lord proclaims to us Christians an entirely different sort of message: "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. But even the hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not, therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows" (Matthew 10:29-31). Here, Jesus is preparing his apostles to proclaim the Gospel in a hostile world, where the risk of persecution would be ever-present. But His message can certainly be applied more broadly to all Christians, as we seek to fulfill our own particular God-given duties in this world of risk: No matter what happens, we can count on our Father's perfect, loving care for us and thus don't need to be afraid! Here, Jesus calls us Christians to radical fearlessness in the fulfillment of our vocations.

But what does this fearlessness look like in practice? It begins with this: that we start every day with prayer to God, that He would send His angels to protect us from danger according to His will. Indeed, God has promised His people the powerful protection of His holy angels in their daily lives. As the Psalmist teaches, "He will command His angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways. On their hands

they will bear you up, lest you strike your foot against a stone" (Psalm 91:11-12). No, God doesn't send us out to fulfill our Christian duties without protection. He sends His angels with us, to guard us in "all our ways." Every day they keep us safe from untold dangers, both of the body and the soul. They protect us from injury, from disease, from the loss of worldly goods, and from spiritual and bodily attack. They actively surround us with the powerful protection of God. Therefore, we should begin every day with prayer for their faithful ministrations, that we can fulfill our vocations in safety, just as Luther models in his Morning Prayer: "Let Your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me."

Second, then, after praying for protection, we should take reasonable precautions to mitigate risks according to our best judgment, while bearing graciously with the differing judgments of others. God has not called us to be reckless. He hasn't called us to take grave, unnecessary risks that are not in keeping with our vocations. To do that would be to put God to the test, as the devil tempted Jesus to do in the wilderness (Matthew 4:5-7). On the other hand, God also has not called us to self-isolate to the extent that we neglect our God-given duties toward Him and toward others. Instead, we are to soberly and thoughtfully assess the prevailing risks, and take those precautions which seem reasonable and moderate and which do not prohibit us from fulfilling our vocations well. Here, we should ask, "What's the actual risk at this moment? How does this risk compare to other risks that I face on a daily basis? What would be the impact of this or that precaution on my Christian life of faith and service? Would the impact be minimal? Or would it significantly interfere?" Here, we should bear graciously with the differing judgments of others, while also seeking to live as "normal" a life as possible, for the sake of our vocations and our Christian confession.

Finally, then, having prayed for protection, and having taken reasonable and moderate precautions, we should go out and fulfill our Christian duties with fearlessness and with joy. Here, our courage comes first from knowing that Christ has defeated death for us and that through faith in Him we will live forever in His kingdom. As Jesus says, "Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 10:39). But, even more than that, our courage comes from knowing that, even now, our heavenly Father is divinely directing every aspect of our lives out of His great love for us, as we heard Jesus say above. Not even a sparrow falls to the ground apart from Him. Are we not of more value

than many sparrows? Even the hairs of our head are numbered. No, this isn't to say that bad things will never happen, or that things in our lives will always make sense. But it is to say that our loving Father is Lord of it all, and we can trust Him perfectly.

It's in this confidence, then, that we can go out and fulfill our vocations fearlessly, in spite of the risks. This means being a good neighbor. This means helping a friend in need. This means offering a hug to someone who desperately needs it and kneeling close to talk to a child. This means seeing others as people to love, rather than threats to avoid. And yes, this means going to church, not only for the sake of our own spiritual life, but also to encourage and build up our brothers and sisters in Christ who need us. These are all God-given duties, and Christ calls us to undertake them fearlessly.

So my friends, don't let the world incite you to fear. Instead, listen to Jesus. Pray for God's protection. Take reasonable precautions. And then go out and fulfill your Christian duties to the best of your ability. In all things, trust in God and don't be afraid. This is how we Christians live faithfully in this world of risk. So strive to do it every day, until God's kingdom is at last revealed and we dwell with Christ in perfect peace forevermore.
