

+ Welcome in the name of Jesus! +

Tonight we observe Good Friday. On this day, we remember the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus Christ, which He willingly endured for our salvation. It stands as a solemn reminder of our sin and it's dire consequences, as well as the unspeakable love of our Creator for us, on account of which He was willing to give His Son into death, that all who believe in Him might not perish but have eternal life.

If you are a <u>VISITOR</u> here, we'd like to offer you our warmest welcome! We pray that your experience among us is blessed, and that you depart filled with God's peace and life.

SOME NOTES ABOUT TONIGHT'S SERVICE:

Good Friday is part of the sacred Triduum, the three-day observance of Christ's Passover.

Good Friday is not observed as a funeral for Christ. It is a day for repentance over sin, and restrained joy and praise for the redemption Christ accomplished for us on the cross. In keeping with the day's solemn character, music is kept to a minimum, though not silenced. Elaborate words of praise are omitted. The altar remains bare, having been stripped on Holy (Maundy) Thursday.

The service of Tenebrae (meaning "darkness") consists of the extinguishing of the church lights. Historically, it occurred early in the morning at the offices of Matins and Lauds on all three days of the Triduum. In recent times, the service has been observed only on the evening of Good Friday.

A more recent addition to Tenebrae, referred to as the "strepitus," occurs after the last candle is extinguished. The "strepitus" consists of a loud noise that is made by banging on a pew, or slamming shut a large book. This action has a variety of interpretations, including the scourging by the soldiers, the earthquake at the moment of Christ's death, or the closing of the tomb.

Tenebrae concludes with the final collect. As with the service for Holy (Maundy) Thursday, there is no benediction. The extended service of the Triduum (three days) will conclude with the Vigil of Easter.

Psalm 27:1-14, Antiphon v. 9b & c (spoken responsively) Turn not your servant away in anger, **P**] O you who have been my help. Cast me not off; forsake me not, С O God of my salvation! **P** The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? C The LORD is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? **P** When evildoers assail me to eat up my flesh, my adversaries and foes, it is they who stumble and fall. C Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war arise against me, yet I will be confident. **P** One thing have I asked of the LORD, that will I seek after: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the LORD and to inquire in his temple. C For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble; he will conceal me under the cover of his tent; he will lift me high upon a rock. **P** And now my head shall be lifted up above my enemies all around me, and will offer in his tent sacrifices with shouts of joy; I will sing and make melody to the LORD. C Hear, O LORD, when I cry aloud; be gracious to me and answer me! You have said, "Seek my face." **P** My heart says to you, "Your face, LORD, do I seek." С Hide not your face from me. Turn not your servant away in anger, O you who have been my help. Cast me not off; forsake me not, O God of my salvation! **P** For my father and my mother have forsaken me, but the LORD will take me in. Teach me your way, O LORD, C and lead me on a level path

because of my enemies.

- C Cast me not off; forsake me not, O God of my salvation!



С Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit. **P** Then I will teach transgressors your ways, and sinners will return to you. С Deliver me from bloodguiltiness, O God, O God of my salvation, and my tongue will sing aloud of your righteousness. **P** O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise. C For you will not delight in sacrifice, or I would give it; you will not be pleased with a burnt offering. P The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise. Do good to Zion in your good pleasure; С build up the walls of Jerusalem; then will you delight in right sacrifices, P in burnt offerings and whole burnt offerings; then bulls will be offered on your altar. P Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!

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P The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. John, the 19th chapter.

Passion Reading 1

John 19:1–16a

¹Then Pilate took Jesus and flogged him. ²And the soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head and arrayed him in a purple robe. ³They came up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and struck him with their hands. ⁴Pilate went out again and said to them, "See, I am bringing him out to you that you may know that I find no guilt in him." ⁵So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Behold the man!" ⁶When the chief priests and the officers saw him, they cried out, "Crucify him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no guilt in him." ⁷The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die because he has made himself the Son of God." ⁸When Pilate heard this statement, he was even more afraid. ⁹He entered his headquarters again and said to Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave him no answer. ¹⁰So

Pilate said to him, "You will not speak to me? Do you not know that I have authority to release you and authority to crucify you?" ¹¹Jesus answered him, "You would have no authority over me at all unless it had been given you from above. Therefore, he who delivered me over to you has the greater sin."

¹²From then on Pilate sought to release him, but the Jews cried out, "If you release this man, you are not Caesar's friend. Everyone who makes himself a king opposes Caesar." ¹³So when Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus out and sat down on the judgment seat at a place called The Stone Pavement, and in Aramaic Gabbatha. ¹⁴Now it was the day of Preparation of the Passover. It was about the sixth hour. He said to the Jews, "Behold your King!" ¹⁵They cried out, "Away with him, away with him, crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar." ¹⁶So he delivered him over to them to be crucified.

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Stand Passion Reading 2

^{16b}So they took Jesus, ¹⁷and he went out, bearing his own cross, to the place called the place of a skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha. ¹⁸There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, and Jesus between them. ¹⁹Pilate also wrote an inscription and put it on the cross. It read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." ²⁰Many of the Jews read this inscription, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic, in Latin, and in Greek. ²¹So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but rather, 'This man said, I am King of the Jews." ²²Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written."

²³When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his garments and divided them into four parts, one part for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom, ²⁴so they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be." This was to fulfill the Scripture which says,

"They divided my garments among them,

and for my clothing they cast lots."

So the soldiers did these things, ²⁵but standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. ²⁶When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son!" ²⁷Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home.

²⁸After this, Jesus, knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfill the Scripture), "I thirst." ²⁹A jar full of sour wine stood there, so they put a sponge full of the sour wine on a hyssop branch and held it to his mouth. ³⁰When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished," and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

³¹Since it was the day of Preparation, and so that the bodies would not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken and that they might be taken away. ³²So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him. ³³But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. ³⁴But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. ³⁵He who saw it has borne witness—his testimony is true, and he knows that he is telling the truth—that you also may believe. ³⁶For these things took place that the Scripture might be fulfilled: "Not one of his bones will be broken." ³⁷And again another Scripture says, "They will look on him whom they have pierced."

³⁸After these things Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus, and Pilate gave him permission. So he came and took away his body. ³⁹Nicodemus also, who earlier had come to Jesus by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds in weight. ⁴⁰So they took the body of Jesus and bound it in linen cloths with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. ⁴¹Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb in which no one had yet been laid. ⁴²So because of the Jewish day of Preparation, since the tomb was close at hand, they laid Jesus there.




Strepitus

Strepitus is Latin for "clash," or "boom." Here, St. Mark's large, Processional Bible that is opened to Isaiah 53 is slammed shut, the resulting "boom" signifying our Lord's tomb being closed, and the end of all his work of salvation for us.
